## » A PLACE TO **REFLECT AND LEARN**

Our starting point is that pupils are capable of making informed choices and acting in their own interests. Individuals are respected, regardless of their faith (or no faith) background.

We view all our activities as part of our contribution to the spiritual development of pupils; helping them to learn about Christian beliefs and see authentic faith in action.

One of the key elements to any SU Group is exploring the Bible through open discussion, encouraging questions and sharing experiences.

SU Groups can take different forms:

- a handful of pupils chatting together, or a busy classroom engaged in a fun activity;
- held at lunchtime or after school;
- meeting in a classroom or gym hall.

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## THE YOUNG PEOPLE OF SU SCOTLAND DECIDED THAT SU GROUPS SHOULD:

- be safe places where all pupils are welcomed and respected; where Christian values are modelled;
- be fun, memorable, exciting and age-appropriate;
- have good, challenging, interactive Bible engagement;
- have time where there is opportunity for prayer;
- be well structured and led; the leader(s) recognising and using the talents of others;
- have a positive impact on the school, and be known amongst pupils;
- explore Christian faith and encourage one another on their journey;
- work cooperatively and openly with the leadership of the school.



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
